2013 Louisiana Legislative Session

It was a very busy week at the Capitol this week. Thank you to everyone who reached out to their legislators on the bills of concern.

Advocacy Action Requests for Week 3 of session- Act Now!

There are several key bills that are anticipated to be scheduled for the Health and Welfare committees next week. Please reach out to the legislators on the committees and the full House or Senate to let them know you want them to support or oppose the bills. If your schedule permits, please consider being present at the capitol. Below are the bills of interest along with talking points.

SB 185, Murray- Provides relative to Medicaid and certain managed health care organizations providing health care services to Medicaid beneficiaries (This bill was scheduled for week 2 but was voluntarily deferred until this week. See talking points below)

HB 527, Hoffmann- Provides relative to the practice of optometry and the regulation of such profession. (Everyone worked very hard to keep this bill from getting out of the committee but the opposition did the same and were able to move the bill forward. This bill is likely to be heard on the House floor early next week. Please reach out to your

Talking points (Thank you to the Louisiana Ophthalmology Association and the Louisiana State Medical Society for putting this bullet points together):

SUPPORT SB 185 – What does the bill do? SB 185 will reduce administrative burden on Medicaid providers which has been exponentially increased due to the transition into Medicaid managed care. Reducing administrative burden will allow for more consistent care being given to Medicaid recipients. The bill addresses four major issues:

(1) Drug Formulary Reforms. The legislation would require all Bayou Health plans to use the same formulary which is determined by a new P&T Committee. The bill further requires the Bayou Health plans to use a standard single page prior authorization form for drugs. Additionally, the bill requires Bayou Health to use the same step therapy override provisions as commercial health plans have to use.

(2) Provider Credentialing. Under current law, the Bayou Health plans do not have to abide by any time limits as to the length of time which they can take to credential providers. Thus, many providers have waited great lengths of time to be credentialed and placed into the plan systems so that they can properly bill for the services they provide. We believe this credentialing process is too long and cumbersome. Bayou Health plans should have to credential providers in the same manner as commercial health plans which is accomplished by mimicking the credentialing language found in the state Insurance Code. Specifically, the credentialing process has to be completed within 90 days and the plans are required to use the standardized credentialing form promulgated by the Department of Insurance. In addition, health plans have to follow the same law commercial health plans have to follow when providing interim credentialing to physicians who join existing groups who are under contract.

(3) Claims Payments. Currently, each Bayou Health plan can utilize their own methods for remitting claim payments or denials to providers. This legislation would standardize the denial process and require each plan to use the same denial codes that are utilized in the fee for service Medicaid program. In addition, the legislation specifically spells out the information which must be contained in the remittance advice.

(4) Care for newborns. The Department of Health and Hospitals currently requires all Bayou Health plans to reimburse providers for care given within the first 30 days of life of a newborn regardless of whether the provider is enrolled in the particular health plan of the child or not. This requirement, although laudable, has not been reduced to writing and therefore is at the whim of the health plan whether or not the directive is followed. This legislation puts that requirement in writing so that providers who provide this critical care can have some sort of authority to rely upon when defending against denied claims.

Why is the legislation needed? Providers should treat patients, not spend time doing excessive paperwork. Since the inception of Bayou Health, physicians and other providers have faced an exponential increase in administrative overhead. This increased overhead deprives the provider from spending their valued time treating patients.

OPPOSE HB 527- What does the bill do? HB 527 gives optometrists open-ended authority to perform almost any surgical procedure. It would authorize optometrists to perform procedures using multiple methods and instruments including scalpels, lasers, needles, ultrasound, ionizing radiation and by burning and freezing tissue. HB 527 would also allow optometrists to inject any drug, except in Schedules I and II.

HB 527 gives optometrists open ended authority to perform almost any surgical procedure

- HB 527 is an optometric blank check to practice medicine. This standard is far different than four years of medical school, a hospital residency, and at least three years of an ophthalmology residency program.
- Surgery involves not just performing the procedures, but deciding who needs to have a procedure done and who does not. It involves patient education and be the ability to identify and manage complications. This cannot be learned in a weekend mini-course.

HB 527 would authorize optometrists to perform procedures using multiple methods and instruments including scalpels, lasers, needles, ultrasound, ionizing radiation and by burning and freezing tissue.

- This provision would allow optometrists to perform eyelid surgeries, surgeries involving needles and injections, glaucoma and cataract procedures, and dozens of other surgical procedures not specifically prohibited.
- The prohibition against performing surgeries on non-suspected malignancies is fairly meaningless from a surgical perspective, since determining malignancy or non-malignancy requires years of training.

HB 527 would authorize optometrists to use lasers

- Lasers are surgical instruments that cut as deeply and sharply as any scalpel.
- The bill allows optometrists to perform laser surgeries in the anterior segment of the eye, laser glaucoma surgeries, AND some forms of laser vision correction (e.g., LASEK).
- Optometrists do not have the education and training to safely perform laser surgery or to manage immediate complications.

HB 527 would allow optometrists to inject any drug, except in Schedules I and II.

- HB 527 would allow optometrists to administer the injectable form of virtually any therapeutic or diagnostic drug into the vascular system, muscle tissue, different levels of skin tissue, around and behind the eye, into the eyelid and into the eye.
- Injections may cause cardiac events, perforate the globe of the eye, cause allergic reactions, or result in a drug entering the blood stream too quickly if a vein is inadvertently injected.

Optometrists do not have the training to perform these procedures or manage the complications that can arise with these procedures.

- Surgical proficiency is acquired through years of medical education and clinical training. After completion of a four-year medical education program and a one-year hospital internship, an ophthalmology resident then gains critical surgical expertise and judgment in a one-on-one three-year surgical residency program.
- The optometry education model does not provide a focused in-depth surgical training experience for its students.

HB 527 removes Medical Board oversight of ophthalmic surgery.

- Current law correctly stipulates that any person performing ophthalmic surgery MUST be licensed to practice medicine by the state Medical Board. HB 527 takes that authority away from the Medical Board, and puts it in the hands of the state optometry board, giving non-physicians the absolute authority to determine scope of practice, including who can perform “ophthalmic surgery” as defined by current law.

As promised, DHH has posted the list of all Designated Physicians Forms (Attestations) RECEIVED BY PRISM AS OF MARCH 18, 2013 AND VALIDATED BY DHH

If your name is listed, your Designated Physician form has been received and is on file with the Molina Medicaid Provider Enrollment. No further action on your part is necessary to receive the enhanced reimbursement for specified primary care services rendered by designated physicians during calendar years 2013 and 2014. Your effective date for the enhanced reimbursement will be established as January 1, 2013.

Note on Effective Date: Your effective date for enhanced reimbursement is based on the date your complete and correct Designated Physician form is received by Medicaid's Provider Enrollment vendor. If your complete and correct form is received by May 15, 2013, you will receive enhanced reimbursement for eligible services rendered on or after January 1, 2013. If your complete and correct form is received after May 15, 2013, you will receive enhanced reimbursement for eligible services rendered on or after the date the form is received.

In previous guidance, March 31, 2013 was the deadline for form receipt to receive the enhanced reimbursement for eligible services rendered on or after January 1, 2013. The deadline has been extended 45 days due to the recent changes.

New Provider Portal Tool for Requesting & Receiving Authorizations

CHS has new technology available online that allows for immediate response on authorization requests based on certain clinical criteria. If the service can be authorized based on information provided through the online Provider Portal, the requesting provider will receive an authorization number without the need for review by a CHS clinical nurse reviewer. Users can register for this Provider Portal at: <http://providerportal.chsamerica.com/User/Registration>. Questions regarding the use of the Provider Portal can be directed to our Provider Services Hotline at 1-855-247-5248.

Number of Inpatient Days Requested for Inpatient Admission

Please note that CHS requires the estimated number of inpatient days be submitted with all requests for precertification for inpatient admissions. The CHS "Inpatient Precertification Request Form" has been updated on our website to request the total number of days requested. CHS will continue to determine the total number of days approved based on whether continued level of care criteria is met and additional days are warranted.

Clinical Submission Deadline

Effective April 15, 2013, CHS will reinforce a clinical submission deadline of 3:00 pm CST for all initial prior authorization and precertification requests, and concurrent review request. Clinical documentation received after the 3:00 pm deadline will be counted as being received on the next business day. Our required response times are as follows:

Initial Requests

- Eighty percent (80%) of provider requests within 2 (two) business days.
- One-hundred percent (100%) of all requests within 14 business days.

Concurrent Review Requests:

- Ninety-five (95%) of provider requests within 1 (one) business day.
- One-hundred percent (100%) of all requests within 2 (two) business days.

Post Service Authorization Requests:

- The turnaround time for authorization requests for services that have already been provided is 30 days.

AMA webinar helps doctors prepare for Sunshine Act

An AMA webinar April 24 will help physicians get ready for a forthcoming database that will report payments and other "transfers of value" physicians receive from drug and medical device manufacturers to the public. [Register today](#)

Under the Physician Payment Sunshine Act, manufacturers of drugs, devices and biologicals covered by federal health care programs are required to report any payments and transfers of value they make to physicians and teaching hospitals beginning Aug. 1.

In addition, any ownership or investment interests physicians or their family members have in the manufacturers or group purchasing organizations must be disclosed to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). Most of the information will be posted in a public online database to be launched by Sept. 30, 2014.

Participants in the AMA webinar, offered at 7 p.m. Eastern time April 24, will learn which financial exchanges and ownership interests must be reported, steps they can take now to prepare for public disclosure of this information, and ways they will be able to challenge false, inaccurate or misleading reports.

Presenters also will discuss which types of information are excluded from reporting, such as certified and accredited continuing medical education activities funded by manufacturers and product samples intended for patient use.

Given the importance of this topic to all physicians, the AMA is offering this webinar free of charge to both AMA members and non-members.
