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Legislative Action Alert- ACT NOW!

SB 56 is scheduled to be heard in the Senate Health and Welfare Committee tomorrow. This bill is a significant expansion of scope for Chiropractors. Oppose [SB 56](#) by Senator [Yvonne Dorsey-Colomb](#)

SB 56 significantly expands chiropractors' scope of practice beyond their training and their education. Protect patient safety, vote NO on SB 56.

This piece of legislation allows a chiropractor to provide many of the same services as a physician with less training and education.

- Physicians receive four years of medical school, 3-7 years of residency training, and at least 12,000 hours of patient care training.
- Chiropractors receive four years of graduate education, 2 years of residency, and 2,000 hours of patient care training.

SB 56 would allow chiropractors to examine evaluate, and diagnose patients of all ages for any conditions, injuries, or disorders that interfere with "normal biomechanical function."

This provision would allow chiropractors to provide the same services that family practitioners, pediatricians, internists, gynecologists, radiologists, neurologists, endocrinologists, cardiologists and orthopaedists currently provide!

Chiropractors aren't trained to recognize many potentially life- threatening conditions beyond their specific expertise.

SB 56 would allow chiropractors to order, perform, and use x-rays to diagnose a patient's condition.

The bill also would expand chiropractors' authority to order X-rays. Currently, they are confined to ordering X-rays of the spinal column and boney articulations; this legislation expands that to include the entire body.

SB 56 would allow chiropractors to counsel patients on nutrition, diet, and wellness.

This provision allows chiropractors to treat patients with life threatening chronic conditions like diabetes and heart disease.

Because chiropractors CANNOT prescribe prescription medications, they can only recommend nutritional, herbal, homeopathic, enzymes or other non-prescription drugs.

SB 56 is dangerous legislation that would undermine patient safety.

Chiropractors should not be providing medical care beyond their education and training.

Please support education, and NOT legislation, as the means of increasing scope of practice.

David W. Van Gelder distinguished Service Award—This award is to recognize and honor those rare and dedicated individuals who have contributed substantially to the advancement of the Chapter.

Dr. David Van Gelder served as AAP President from 1976-77. During his tenure, the Academy finalized a voluntary continuing education and assessment program leading to recertification and energized efforts to develop child health planning at state and local levels. In addition, Dr. Van Gelder oversaw changes that were made within the Academy's internal structure to increase efficiency and enhance services for members. He was a vocal advocate for creating a national immunization policy. Under his presidency, the Academy adopted a statement advocating such a policy.

Charles M Vanchiere Award—This award is given to recognize special efforts to improve the health of children in Louisiana by increasing their access to needed health care.

Dr. Charles M. "Buzzy" Vanchiere was a private pediatrician in Lake Charles, Louisiana, for nearly 30 years, and a tireless advocate for children's services. He pushed the private sector to accept Medicaid patients when the state first allowed them to bill for screening and diagnostic services. He was president of the LA Chapter of AAP at the time that the federal State Child Health Insurance Legislation was enacted and he was a major force in assuring that Louisiana took advantage of this new opportunity to cover children. He served on medical committees in his parish, in the state and for the American Academy of Pediatrics. He organized and led the Pediatric Society of Southwest Louisiana and the LSU Pediatric Alumni Association. He chaired the Pediatric Advisory Committee for Medicaid and was a member of the Blue Cross Physician Executive Committee. He was also active in the "Children's Miracle Network" and received its "Miracle Makers" award in 1995 for outstanding service to that program. Dr. Vanchiere died in the year 2000 at the young age of 60 and the Chapter established this award in his name to honor outstanding child advocates.

HHS updates water fluoride recommendation

Federal authorities have adjusted the recommended amount of fluoride in drinking water for the first time in more than 50 years.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) now is calling for 0.7 milligrams per liter of water instead of a range of 0.7 to 1.2 milligrams.

The change was spurred by the greater availability of fluoride as well as more uniform water consumption across the country.

"While additional sources of fluoride are more widely used than they were in 1962, the need for community water fluoridation still continues," U.S. Deputy Surgeon General Rear Adm. Boris D. Lushniak, M.D., M.P.H., said in a news release. "Community water fluoridation continues to reduce tooth decay in children and adults beyond that provided by using only toothpaste and other fluoride-containing products."

Authorities said the new recommended level will help protect teeth while also remaining low enough to limit the risk of slight discoloration of children's teeth.

The Academy supports the new HHS recommendation.

"Hundreds of studies have affirmed community water fluoridation as a safe, equitable, and cost-effective way to protect the oral health of the population," said AAP President Sandra G. Hassink, M.D., FAAP.

Community water fluoridation has been named one of the 10 great public health achievements of the 20th century by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Nearly 75 percent of Americans using public water receive fluoride this way.

In addition to drinking and cooking with tap water, Dr. Hassink encouraged families to eat healthy food and keep up with preventive dental care and good oral hygiene. Dentists and pediatricians can guide them on getting the right amount of fluoride through water, toothpaste and other sources.

Innovative Outpatient Pediatric Diagnostic Error Quality Improvement Project Now Recruiting

Thousands of children are harmed each year by diagnostic errors. Pediatric clinics nationwide are invited to submit a recruitment application to participate in a first of its kind quality improvement project aimed at reducing pediatric diagnostic errors related to (1) missed elevated blood pressure, (2) missed (select) actionable labs and (3) missed opportunity to diagnose adolescent depression. The AAP Practice Improvement Network (PIN) Reducing Diagnostic Errors in Primary Care Pediatrics, or Project RedDE!, is seeking clinic teams that have 30 well-visit encounters specifically with 11 year olds and above, as well as 30 well-visits with patients 3 years old and older per month. The ability to query your EHR and/or billing system to pull charts for this 2 ½ year project is helpful to team participation. This project is being conducted by the Practice Improvement Network, part of the Quality Improvement Innovation Networks (QUIIN) at the American Academy of Pediatrics and is funded by a grant from the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality.

BATON ROUGE, LA – (May 4, 2015) – The Louisiana Health Care Quality Forum and the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals (DHH) launched a web-based survey today to gauge Louisiana residents' awareness of health information technology (IT) tools and patients' rights to access personal health information.

The survey is a key factor in a collaborative effort of the Quality Forum and DHH to promote awareness and the use of health IT tools such as electronic health records (EHRs) and patient portals to improve health outcomes and health care decision-making for Louisiana residents. The effort also includes a focus on educating the state's residents about their rights to access and have copies of their personal health information.

The 10-question survey takes less than two minutes to complete and will provide a baseline of existing health IT awareness levels among Louisiana residents. The survey can be found at www.lhcqf.org and will remain active throughout the month of May.

"We believe engaging health care consumers through this survey will help make them aware of the importance of personal health information," said DHH Secretary Kathy H. Kliebert. "Louisianans can use that data to make better lifestyle and health care decisions."

"Countless case studies have consistently shown that patients who are actively engaged in their health care have better outcomes, reduced health care costs and greater satisfaction with the health care experience," said Cindy Munn, Quality Forum CEO. "Louisiana is very fortunate to have a strong health IT infrastructure that can assist our state's health care consumers in becoming more engaged in their care. Louisiana's health care providers have long been engaged in the adoption of health IT to improve the quality of care; now we are focused on educating consumers about the availability of these tools and resources and how to use them to improve their health."

According to Nadine Robin, Health IT Program Director for the Quality Forum, Louisiana is among a small number of states to take such a proactive role in educating health care consumers about health IT and patient rights.

"Our state is boldly recognizing that we can achieve truly positive gains in health outcomes by ensuring that Louisiana's residents have access to and are using the tools necessary to become active participants in their health care," Robin said. "We are very excited about this campaign and pleased to partner with DHH in the effort to promote meaningful patient engagement."

New Contracting in the Louisiana Behavioral Health Partnership

In November 2014, the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals (DHH) announced a plan to integrate specialty behavioral health care services into its existing Medicaid managed care system called Bayou Health. **This integration is scheduled for December 1, 2015.**

In light of the transition, **Magellan will continue to contract and credential new providers through May 31, 2015.** After May 31, 2015, **new** providers will be directed to the Bayou Health plans. Magellan will continue to re-credential existing network providers. This deadline applies only to new providers. **If you are a provider interested in joining the LBHP network, we need to hear from you very soon!**

Important Points for Interested Providers

New provider *Credentialing Applications* for the LBHP network will be accepted through May 31, 2015

- A potential provider will need to ensure they are certified through OBH **before** credentialing with Magellan for LBHP provider network consideration
- Only a **complete *Credentialing Application*** can be considered (must be complete in its entirety and include all necessary documentation)

Claims related to Bayou Health members formerly enrolled in CHS or UHC with dates of service before Feb. 1, 2015 should be submitted for payment to the appropriate Shared Saving Plan, per usual, no later than July 31, 2015. After July 31, 2015, all such claims must be submitted directly to Molina for payment. Claims submitted to CHS or UHC after July 31, 2015 will deny with edit -998 "submit claim to Molina for processing." Claim appeals and disputes for dates of service prior to Feb 1, 2015, should continue to be sent to CHS and UHC. SUDIA Recipe: Smith Boiled Custard

Smooth and creamy boiled pudding is a classic dessert made simply with eggs, milk, sugar, and vanilla. This recipe from the Smith family also uses cornstarch for extra thickening power.



Ease: Moderate

Yield: 10-12

8 eggs yolks

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoon vanilla

2 cups sugar

2 tablespoons corn starch

7-8 cups milk

Directions:

A heavy sauce pan or double boiler is needed for cooking the ingredients together. Before putting on the stove, mix sugar, salt and corn starch together. Next, stir in egg yolks and mix well. After these ingredients are mixed well, finish cooking on the stove, gradually adding milk. Bring mixture to a boil slowly. Continue to stir and cook at medium heat until the spoon coats when dipping it in the mixture. Add 2 teaspoons vanilla and stir. Place in refrigerator and serve cool. If desired, serve with whipped topping and a cherry.
