Timely Filing Requirements for Close out of Shared Plans

ATTENTION PROVIDERS SUBMITTING SHARED PLAN CLAIMS TO MOLINA
Shared Plan claims received by Molina after the initial one year timely filing limit cannot be processed unless the provider is able to furnish the Shared Plans EOB or Payment Register showing the original claim was filed timely. All proof of timely filing documentation must contain the specific recipient information, provider information and date of service to be considered as proof of timely filing. It must also contain the name of the Shared Plan the claim was originally submitted to. To ensure accurate processing, please be certain that all information is legible.

Claims with dates of service two years old must be submitted to DHH for review with proof of timely filing within the initial one year filing limit. These claims must meet one of the following criteria:

- The recipient was certified for retroactive Medicaid benefits, and the claims were filed within 12 months of the date that retroactive eligibility was granted.
- The recipient won a Medicare or SSI appeal in which he or she was granted retroactive Medicaid benefits.
- The failure of the claim to pay was the fault of the fiscal intermediary or the Louisiana Medicaid Program, rather than the provider's fault, each time the claim was adjudicated.

In order to be considered for the 2-year override, request must include a cover letter describing the criterion that has been met and supporting documentation. Request received that do not meet these requirements will be returned to the provider.

LA AAP Offers Condolences- Dr. Keith Collins



Beloved pediatrician Dr. Keith Collins, noted for his strong bonds with young patients, dies at 45

Dr. Keith Collins, an affable pediatrician who rose to local prominence by forging close bonds with his patients and their parents, died Saturday. He was 45.

The founder of Collins Pediatrics in Metairie and Lakeview, he earned a reputation as a caring, hard-working and knowledgeable doctor and quickly became a prominent member of the area's medical community.

"I think he was so magnificent," said Jennifer Collins, his wife of 22 years. "What he accomplished in such a short time here is such a testament to his work ethic, personality and charisma and will live on with his practice."

Collins was diagnosed in May with cholangiocarcinoma, a rare and aggressive form of cancer, which sparked an outpouring of support, marked by green and white car magnets emblazoned with the slogan "Keep Calm and Cure Keith." About 4,000 of the magnets were eventually distributed.

Though initially shying away from the attention, Collins — the father of six and a man deeply committed to his Catholic faith — agreed to the magnets if people were encouraged to pray when they saw them.

Himself the youngest of nine children, Collins grew up in Metairie and graduated as valedictorian of De La Salle High School in 1987.

Though he had an early interest in medicine, financial considerations led Collins to get to work after getting his undergraduate degree in biomedical engineering at Boston University.

When he decided to pursue his lifelong ambition, he did so with a promise to his wife that going back to school would not detract from his growing family.

He applied three times before being accepted to LSU's medical school. Once there, he would receive its highest honor, the Chancellor's Award for Integrity, Character and Service.

Combining his engineering background with his love of Carnival, Collins devised a set of portable stands — dubbed "siege towers" — that could support more than a dozen people on parade routes. He was also a devoted Saints and LSU fan, often traveling to away games to watch the teams play.

Collins was immediately drawn to pediatrics because of the importance of caring for children and his ability to connect with them, his wife said.

"He was truly interested in everyone's life and just loved interacting with people," she said. "And that was part of what made him such a great doctor."

Dr. David Myers, a longtime friend, said that trait made Collins stand out.

"To be a good pediatrician you have to know your medicine, but to be a great pediatrician you have to be able to relate to kids personally, and he had that for sure," Myers said. "He made them feel like they were the center of his world."

Collins started his own practice just two years out of his residency and quickly built it into a booming business that served the children of elected officials, Saints players and some of his fellow physicians, among others.

His gregarious nature — his favorite activity was talking to other people, his wife said — led to his involvement with community service organizations, including the board of East Jefferson General Hospital and the St. Catherine of Siena Men's Club. He was also a member of Metairie Country Club, the Krewe of Hermes and the Krewe of Baronne.

In addition to his wife, Collins is survived by his six children, Caroline, Keith "Andrew," Julianne, Analiese, Christian and Kyle Collins; and seven siblings, Hank Collins, Kathy Morse, Peggy Collins, Kevin Collins, Kelly Savage, Rosana Preau and Tommy Collins.

A wake will be held at 6 p.m. Thursday at St. Catherine of Siena Church, 105 Bonnabel Blvd., followed by visitation until 9 p.m. Visitation will resume Friday from 9:45 a.m. to 11:45 a.m., with a funeral Mass at noon.

Interment will take place at Metairie Cemetery.

SUDIA Recipe: Overnight Greek and Grain Salad

While bulgur is often cooked on the stovetop, this version lets the grain slowly rehydrate in the refrigerator, saving the mess of cleaning a pot. Add strips of grilled chicken to make this a higher protein dish.

Ease: Easy

Yield: 6 (1 cup) servings

Preparation Time: 30 minutes

Passive: 4 hours or overnight

Ingredients

1 1/2 cups medium grain bulgur wheat
1 1/2 cups chopped assorted bell pepper (red, yellow, orange)
1/3 cup finely chopped red onion
1 cup tomato juice
1 cup water
1/3 cup extra virgin olive oil
1/3 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice
2 teaspoons dried oregano
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
1 1/2 cups chopped cucumber
6 ounces crumbled feta cheese
1/4 cup pitted Kalamata olives, chopped
1/2 chopped fresh parsley

Directions

Combine first 10 ingredients (bulgur through black pepper) in a large bowl. Cover and refrigerate for at least 4 hours or overnight. Uncover bulgur mixture just before serving and stir in cucumber, feta cheese, olives and parsley. Serve on plates or in bowls with a lemon wedge for squeezing.

2015 National Pediatric Disaster Coalition Conference

You are invited to attend the National Pediatric Disaster Coalition Conference (NPDC) November 2-4, 2015 at the Camelback Inn Resort and Spa in Scottsdale, Arizona. The purpose of the NPDC is to provide medical practitioners; clinical staff; hospital emergency management; other hospital representatives; prehospital providers; educators, school nurses and other school representatives; behavioral health providers; and faith-based organization representatives with tools, training, resources, and information **to improve pediatric disaster preparedness**. Speakers will examine a broad spectrum of pediatric disaster response, resilience, extended care, recovery, and coalition topics as gleaned from surviving Hurricane Sandy, the Boston Marathon bombing, the Joplin tornado, the Sandy Hook shooting, and more. Continuing Education Credits are available, and accommodations are available for access and functional needs populations.

The National Advisory Committee on Children and Disasters’ Surge Capacity Work Group Report (April 28, 2015) “recommended to ASPR to . . . support convening pediatric health care coalition and preparedness stakeholders annually to assess strategic planning, gap analysis, and mitigation tactics for addressing . . . threats with national implications.” In addition, the NACCD states “coalitions will benefit from . . . sharing information, strategies, resources, and challenges, and thus [identifying] many unused and unrecognized tools existing at the local, state, and national levels [to] . . . avoid reinventing the wheel with each response . . .”
